Description

A fine and unusual Victorian walking stick by Briggs of London, hallmarked in London in 1896 and distinguished by its elegant silver mounts and concealed measuring slot. Combining practical ingenuity with the understated refinement of late 19th-century gentleman's accessories, it is a handsome example of a walking stick made for both everyday use and social display.

The slender shaft is fitted with silver mounts bearing the marks of Briggs of London, one of the capital's most respected makers of umbrellas, walking sticks, and fine accessories. The most intriguing feature is the integrated measure slot: a discreet detail that reveals the Victorian taste for cleverly engineered, multi-functional objects. Such features transformed a conventional cane into a useful personal tool while preserving its polished appearance.

Briggs of London was renowned for well-made accessories intended for the discerning city gentleman, and the quality of this piece is evident in its balanced proportions and restrained silver detailing. The 1896 London hallmarks firmly place it in the late Victorian period, when beautifully crafted canes remained an essential component of formal dress.

An appealing collector's object with both decorative and practical interest, this silver-mounted Briggs walking stick would be a sophisticated addition to a collection of Victorian accessories, London silver, gentleman's canes, or unusual measuring instruments. It also makes an impressive display piece in a hall, library, study, or dressing room.
