Description

A wonderfully characterful large 18th-century French hand-hammered copper coquemar, raised on an unusual and highly decorative set of ornate fret-cut legs. Rich in warmth, texture, and rustic presence, this remarkable vessel is a fine example of French folk-art metalwork, combining practical domestic function with the expressive hand of its maker.

Traditionally used for heating water over an open fire, the coquemar is an iconic form in French rural life. This impressive example has a generous, rounded copper body, shaped by hand and retaining the lively hammer marks that give the surface its depth and individuality. Its warm, aged patina has developed beautifully over time, with subtle variations in colour and tone that speak to centuries of use and handling.

What sets this piece apart is its elaborate fret-cut ironwork support. Rather than a simple utilitarian stand, the scrolling and pierced legs lend the coquemar an almost architectural quality, elevating it from a domestic cooking vessel to a striking decorative object. The contrast between the richly burnished copper and the dark, sculptural ironwork creates a particularly compelling visual effect.

With its generous scale and strong silhouette, this exceptional French folk-art piece would make a dramatic focal point in a kitchen, dining room, fireplace setting, or country-house interior. It would also sit beautifully within a collection of antique copper, culinary antiques, or traditional European decorative arts.

A rare and evocative survivor of 18th-century French domestic life, offering sculptural beauty, honest craftsmanship, and the enduring appeal of hand-worked materials.
