A rare 18th century Scottish linen damask commemorative napkin marking the wedding of George and Marey Greig in 1754.

Scottish linen damask is a luxurious fabric renowned for its intricate woven patterns and rich heritage. Originating in the 18th century, it became a hallmark of quality textile production in towns like Dunfermline.

Made from fine flax fibres, the damask features reversible designs, often floral or geometric, created through a complex weaving process. Prized for its durability, elegance, and sheen, Scottish damask was once a staple in aristocratic homes and formal dining settings. Though industrial decline impacted production, it remains a symbol of craftsmanship.
